



POWER TOOL SAFETY

Failure to follow operation instructions may result in serious personal injury, electrical shock, and/or fire.

A. Do not use loose clothing or jewelry. Keep your clothing and gloves away from moving parts. Avoid accidental starting. Be sure the power switch is in the locked or off position before inserting battery pack.

B. Remove adjusting keys or wrenches before turning the tool on. Do not overreach. Keep proper footing and balance.

C. Always wear appropriate eye or face protection for the job.

D. Use proper means to secure work piece before starting work. Never secure the work piece with your hands or body as it is unstable and may lead to an injury.

E. Disconnect battery pack from tool. If the tool has an off switch, place it in the off position before making any adjustments or changing accessories.

F. Keep drilling bits sharp and clean. Pilot holes shall be used when appropriate. Sharp cutting bits and the use of pilot holes are less likely to bind and are easier to control. If drill has means for an auxiliary/side handle, it must be used. Do not attempt to operate without holding the drill with both hands. Numerous injuries have occurred due to drill bit binding. Using a drill handle will help avoid such injuries.

G. Wear hearing protection when using a power tool with intensive noise or for prolonged periods of time as hearing loss or damage to the ear drum may result from high sound levels.

Bring your own water and shade. Do not arrive prior to 7:30.


