Upon finding that my brother John had indeed brought the suitcase home with him, we of course prodded him for more information. By this time more of our car club members had arrived at the meeting and we all listened as John revealed the amazing story of how he came into possession of Marge's suitcase.

On Sunday, the day after the family reunion, it seems that after church and breakfast, John, sister Harriet, sister Marie, brother-in-law Ruben, niece Linda, and a couple of our nephews, decided that for lack of a better suggestion, the show at Jordan might be of interest. After all, Dave and Marge seem to enjoy going to them and always have a good time. Maybe they should try it. They arrived during the parade and watched as the rest of the parade finished, and then walked around looking at the displays, and of course the flea market, which was the deciding factor in going in the first place. As John and Linda were looking through the flea market area, Linda hears an announcement over the loud speaker about a suitcase found near St. Cloud, Minnesota (about 100 miles away) on the previous day. John immediately thinks of our lost suitcase, but how did it arrive at Jordan?

John and Linda get to the speaker stand and inquire about the announcement and are met by Ricki Shultz. She takes them out to her car to identify the suitcase and then explains how it came to her.

The night before, she accepted a collect call from a man in Minneapolis who claimed to have a suitcase of hers that he found in St. Cloud earlier the same day. He saw it come off the truck but by the time he stopped, picked up the suitcase, and tried to catch the truck, we were gone. He also said he looked through the suitcase and only found a scrap of paper with the name of John and Ricki Shultz, Carver, Minnesota, and a phone number. So he called to say she could pick it up at his house. The man said he brought the suitcase home with him, and he would leave it on the front porch because he had to work that night. Now, Ricki Shultz was pretty sure this was not her suitcase, as it had been nearly a year since they had been through St. Cloud. However, maybe they lost something then and it was only turning up now. John and Ricki knew that the area of Minneapolis that the man lived in was not a good area and they were very leery so they drove in from the little town of Carver. Marge and I have thanked the Good Lord many times for the return of the suitcase and the good people we have met as a result of it. We also believe this was a lot more than a bunch of mere "coincidences". We hope you enjoyed reading this story.
